Councilmember Mark Hamm moved to approve that all items under the Consent Docket be considered in one vote, to include the addendum. Mayor David Bennett seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

D. REGULAR AGENDA ITEMS THAT MAY REQUIRE ITPC ACTION

1. Public Hearing and Action on Request to Adopt the Proposed Public Participation Plan (PPP) Update

Chairman Gentling opened the public hearing. There being no response from the public, the public hearing was closed.

Hannah Nolen highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum. She referred to the <u>link</u> provided where the final version of the PPP could be viewed.

There being no discussion, Councilmember Josh Moore moved to adopt the proposed Public Participation Plan update. Councilmember Mark Hamm seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

2. Public Hearing and Action on Request for Amendment to the FFY 2020 Transit Element of the FFY 2020-2023 Oklahoma City Area Regional Transportation Study (OCARTS) Area TIP by COTPA

Chairman Gentling opened the public hearing. There being no response from the public, the public hearing was closed.

Hayden Harrison highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum. Mayor Stan Wieczorek asked about the cost of the electric buses. Jason Ferbrache said the buses are very expensive and this is the second electric bus COTPA has procured. He said they received shipment of their first electric bus two weeks ago, and so obviously appreciate the support of this committee. Mayor Wieczorek asked about the range of the electric buses. Mr. Ferbrache said it varies widely depending on climate control, if you have to run the air conditioner and heater a lot, but they are optimistic that they will get 100 miles per charge. Councilmember Josh Moore asked about the riverboat, wondering if passengers will be able to get off the riverboat and walk to the museum. Mr. Ferbrache said yes, the idea is, with First Americans Museum being right there on the river, hopefully they can generate some transit trips taking people to Bricktown, down to the First American Museum, the Meridian Corridor, etc.

Mayor Stan Wieczorek moved to amend the FFY 2020-2023 OCARTS Area TIP by adding the attached program of projects to the COTPA FFY 2020 Transit Element and submit the same to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) for amendment of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Councilmember Josh Moore seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Encompass 2045 Plan Overview

Jennifer Sebesta said over the next year, ACOG staff will be bringing the committee more information on our region's 2045 plan. She then provided a brief overview of the development process for the plan.

Commissioner Marc Hader showed concern about the Canadian County population numbers that were on the consent docket, hoping to get more accurate figures. John Sharp said ACOG gets three sets of projections – the Department of Commerce, Woods and Poole, and ACOG trend data from 1980 to 2015. He said one thing ACOG saw was that all of the projections for Canadian County were not high enough; in fact, they were lower than the 2040 projections. That is something ACOG will have to address. He said that in the last plan, they had to add about 20,000 to the county population totals, because when they disaggregate the county totals down to the city level, sometimes there is not enough population to handle the growth, so that is why they have an accurate county total.

Commissioner Hader asked how there could be better public outreach than with the Encompass 2040 Plan. Ms. Sebesta said this time, ACOG is trying to have different types of engagement activities and events. Mark Sweeney added that because there is now a bus stop at ACOG, some of the meetings can take place here.

Mr. Sweeney asked if the boundaries of our MPO are subject to any potential change based on the population collection that occurred for 2020. Mr. Sharp said ACOG will receive the census data sometime next year and then in 2022, ACOG will conduct a boundary study. He said this is done every ten years to determine if the boundary needs to be changed. Generally, it is not changed unless the area outside the boundary is about the same density and same employment as inside the boundary. The actual federal funding is tied to the urban area boundary, which consists of a density over a thousand persons per square mile.

Mr. Sharp said the State Legislature gave ACOG four counties. For the transportation boundary, ACOG has gone outside the four county boundary, down to Tuttle and Grady County and taken about two-thirds of McClain County. This is because there are so many people commuting into Tinker AFB, Downtown Oklahoma City, and other places that ACOG felt they had to include those areas. He said Canadian County is one of the higher areas of workers actually flowing into Oklahoma County, so ACOG watches that area as well. He said to stay tuned to 2022 when this issue will be revisited.

4. Encompass 2045 Plan Public Survey

Hannah Nolen said that in preparation for our long-range plan update, ACOG will be asking for public input via an online survey and will use the results of the survey in the consideration of regional transportation priorities, goals, and strategies. The survey is concise. It only has 11 questions and should take less than 10 minutes to complete.

The survey opened on September 15 and will close on October 15 to allow a month to get as many responses as possible. ACOG staff is also promoting the survey on social media.

Ms. Nolen asked the committee members to please complete the survey and share the link with their colleagues and communities. She said it would be appreciated, as the desire is to get the survey to as many people as possible.

5. Transportation News and Update Report

John Sharp presented the following transportation news and updates:

Air Installations Compatible Use Zones (AICUZ) Study Draft

This draft report is out for review and gives an idea about Tinker Air Force Base noise sensitive areas, accident potential, and land use issues. ACOG found out that they have about 30,000 plus employees, which will be used for generator trips for the 2045 Plan.

Surface Transportation Block Group Workshop and Call for Projects

ACOG staff is currently fielding questions from local communities as they are starting to develop their transportation projects and ACOG is starting to review those projects.

Encompass 2045 Plan

In October, ACOG is planning the first 2045 Plan stakeholder advisory group meeting and has reached out to interested groups to provide a representative. ACOG also released the 2045 Plan Survey, already having over 300 responses. He said a lot of bicycle and pedestrian advocates have submitted surveys, so the desire is to also have transit riders, long distance commuters, and the freight industry participate in the survey.

Quarterly State Transportation Innovation Committee

ACOG staff attended the Quarterly State Transportation Innovation Committee meeting to discuss new ways in which ODOT and other states around the country are handling transportation planning and engineering.

Oklahoma Educational Television Authority (OETA) Interview

ACOG staff was interviewed by OETA regarding the I-235 interchange project. ACOG discussed some of the challenges of keeping an interchange open when working on such extensive redesign and construction, and the growth in traffic through that interchange.

Possible Merger between Oklahoma Turnpike Authority (OTA) and ODOT

ACOG was asked for its views of a possible merger between OTA/ODOT. Guidehouse, a consultant from ODOT, hosted the interview and ACOG was asked a list of questions. Generally speaking, ACOG has worked well with both OTA and ODOT. Obviously, ODOT is larger and ACOG has more frequent conversations with them. He said with ODOT's new role in transit, it makes some sense to combine these departments into one agency.

Norman Transportation News

Norman staff provided an update at a recent Transportation Management Center Stakeholder meeting regarding the ITS and Emergency Management facility they are building.

ACOG FHWA/FTA Certification Review

ACOG staff is coordinating with Isaac Akem, FHWA-Oklahoma Division, on the Certification Review scheduled at the end of October 2020. ACOG staff received a list of topics/subject areas that they will be reporting on. This process also includes feedback from local transit agencies and ODOT. This review occurs every four years.

I-35 Corridor Study

ACOG staff attended multiple meetings with ODOT and the consultant working on the I-35 Corridor study (through Moore and Norman). He said next year the corridor will be modeled to determine any capacity issues, and ACOG will be talking to them about possible solutions.

ACOG Staff Member Won Best in Show AND World Champion Award

Hannah Nolen, with the assistance of ACOG's Senior Art Designer, won "Best in Show" for the <u>Tree Canopy Assessment Story Map</u>, AND additionally, the "World Champion" award at the regional ESRI mapping conference this week. Mr. Sharp displayed the map for the committee members to view.

Bus Rapid Transit Project

ACOG staff provided data to COTPA for their Bus Rapid Transit project that will be located on Classen and NW Expressway.

Quarterly Transit Coordination Meeting

ACOG recently hosted the Quarterly Transit Coordination Meeting, which includes COTPA, Norman Transit, Citylink in Edmond, First Capitol Trolley in Guthrie, ODOT, and others.

Bike to Work Day/Week

Mr. Sharp said this is Bike to Work Day/Week and Jordan Evans, our Multimodal Transportation Planner, was interviewed live this week on the radio. Mr. Evans

currently is attending the grand opening of a new bike facility on General Pershing Blvd, just east of the Fairgrounds. It is a two-lane facility with bike lanes on the outside.

Electric Vehicles Interim Study

ACOG staff attended and presented at an Interim Study at the State Capitol on the subject of electric vehicles. This study was hosted by Representative Hill from Mustang. Secretary of Transportation Tim Gatz, Secretary of Commerce Sean Kouplen, and a number of automotive, electric utilities, and CO-OPs were there to present at an all-day affair.

Air Quality News

ACOG has a new Clean Cities Intern, Brooke Savoy, a UCO student. Her intern position is paid for by the Department of Energy and she will be helping with air quality issues.

Central Oklahoma Clean Cities Coalition Awards Winners

This year the Zach D. Taylor Clean Cities Vision Awards for achievement in deployment of alternative fuels and advanced field vehicle technologies go to the City of Edmond (Phil Jones) and Representative Brian Hill, and Coalition Stakeholder of the Year went to James Brown of Tinker Air Force Base, who has been working with ACOG on air quality issues. Tinker is very sensitive regarding air quality issues and ACOG has received a great deal of help from them. Representative Hill hosted the Electric Vehicle (EV) Interim Study and has been very interested in EV issues, and the City of Edmond has installed eight Level Two charging stations.

National Drive Electric Week (NDEW)

NDEW is coming up soon. Folks interested in having the electric driving experience can schedule to test drive a Chevy Volt at Bob Howard Chevrolet in Edmond. All test drivers receive a free T-shirt. There will be a Poker Run at five locations for a \$200 Visa gift card prize. There are other sponsors that have provided other prizes: Bison Superbikes, Oklahoma Municipal Power Authority, UCO, AAA, and Bob Howard Chevrolet.

Vice-Mayor Roger Malone asked if at the meeting with the OTA, they gave a projected opening date for the eastern Oklahoma Turnpike. Mr. Sharp said OTA is thinking it will be fully open in the spring of 2021 and it will be called the Kickapoo Turnpike.

Mayor Sheila Stevenson asked if anyone had written grants yet for the Volkswagen settlement. Eric Pollard said ACOG staff is assisting a variety of entities with filling out applications. Ms. Stevenson asked if there was still time to submit an application and Mr. Pollard said yes, until Wednesday. The application must replace a Class 4 through Class 8 vehicle that must be 2009 or older and has to line up with a new vehicle. He said ACOG staff can help her.

Chairman Gentling asked if there was any new business to present. No new business was presented.

INFORMATION:

ACOG staff has developed the preliminary 2045 OCARTS employment projections by county and city for use in the 2045 Plan. As in past plans, staff used Woods and Poole employment projections by county as a guide for development of the OCARTS area numbers. The Woods and Poole 2045 numbers are by place of residence, and, for modeling purposes, staff requires the data to be by place of work. Therefore, some data adjustments occur before the model runs.

To determine the employment data by place of work, staff calculated the ratio between the 2015 OCARTS county employment totals (Table 1) and the 2015 Woods and Poole full county totals. This ratio was then applied to the 2045 Woods and Poole figure to calculate the new 2045 OCARTS county data by place of employment totals. This also accounts for OCARTS geography.

After the County level forecasts were developed, the city level employment figures were calculated. Past trends in employment growth, the 2040 OCARTS Plan city employment totals, and 2045 Woods and Poole projections (modified by place of work) were used to develop the 2045 city level employment (Table 2). A comment field was added to identify how the preliminary 2045 population by city was chosen. Generally, the 2040 Plan, Woods and Poole (W&P), Average of Trend + W&P, Trend, or ACOG staff recommendations were the options given by staff. These employment projections lead to an employment growth rate of 49 percent in the OCARTS area between 2015-2045.

After review and comment, staff expects to bring final employment projections back in November for committee approval. Following approval of the 2045 county and city employment totals, staff can make further progress with the scenario modeling for the disbursement of the 2045 employment throughout the region.

In 2009, ACOG developed a Public Fleet Conversion Grants program in response to tightening air quality standards and the prospect of EPA nonattainment designation in Central Oklahoma. Alternative fuels and vehicles, as well as advanced vehicle technologies, continue to be viable fleet strategies to mitigate vehicle emissions and the volume of fuel consumed.

To date, ACOG's Public Fleet Conversion Grants program has awarded over \$4 million in Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) funds to help OCARTS member entities and OCARTS area public entities purchase clean-fuel and clean-emission fleet vehicles, and alternative fueling infrastructure.

ACOG released its Call for Projects under the ACOG CLEAN AIR Grants for OCARTS Area Public Fleets on October 1, offering \$350,000 in CMAQ funding.

INFORMATION:

In accordance with provisions of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, the Oklahoma Division office of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and the Region VI office of the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) have been charged with the responsibility of conducting a review of the OCARTS area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO).

The purpose of the certification review is to evaluate the MPO's transportation planning process, and to determine if the process meets the requirements of federal law. FHWA and FTA will be meeting with various representatives of ACOG, Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT), Central Oklahoma Transportation and Parking Authority (COTPA), and the City of Norman (as a public transit provider) to discuss the MPO's performance and the work of its regional planning partners as outlined in the Memorandum of Understanding and the Unified Planning Work Program.

ACOG, in coordination with COTPA and Norman Transit, transmitted requested documents and materials on October 12 to complete the Desk Audit portion of the review.

The on-site review portion, scheduled for Tuesday, October 27 through Thursday, October 29, includes a virtual public listening session, interviews of ITPC members, and meetings with transportation planning staff from ACOG, ODOT, COTPA, and Norman Transit.

Members of the federal team will present the preliminary findings of the certification review process to the ITPC at the October 29 meeting. The official report will be provided to the committee once finalized by FHWA and FTA.

With this letter, the City of Warr Acres is requesting that an agenda item be added for the upcoming October 2020 Intermodal Transportation Technical and Policy Committee meetings, related to an amendment to the upcoming FFY 2021 Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP). Specifically, the request involves:

Move Project STP-55A(96)AG, J/P 17827(04), for the Grade, Drain, Widening & Resurfacing, Traffic Signals of N. MacArthur Between N.W. 34th and N.W. 47th Streets in the City of Warr Acres, Oklahoma County. From the FFY 2020 to the FFY 2021 TIP (Federal Share-\$5,047,489)

A summary of the status of Pre-Construction activities are as follows:

- Engineering Design-100% Plans P,S, & E) have been submitted to ODOT.
- Right-of-Way Acquisition-On Going-Based and basically complete. Environmental determinations and approval this process has moved to the forefront of our efforts. Fifty-one (51) of Fifty-two (52) parcels along the affected corridor have been secured, the only one (1) that is remaining has verbally been agreed upon by the owner, waiting on the actions of the national tenant. NOTE: we have reviewed and have a plan to eliminate the required work if this is not secured within 30 days.
- Utility Relocations-Utility Coordination has been ongoing with all required companies, two (2) of the four facility owners have completed relocation, with the other two (2) having crews on site to complete this work.
- Bid Opening-ODOT has assigned a January 2021 Bid Date for this project. Without further delays for the
 utility relocation completion, Warr Acres is preparing to sign the final documents for certification of
 project ready for bidding.
- Warr Acres and ODOT are in continuing communication about status of this project and the timing of their letting schedules. We will continue to focus on completion of all required tasks to ensure this project is available to let in this FY funding cycle.





FINAL 2045 OCARTS COUNTY AND CITY POPULATION PROJECTIONS

INFORMATION:

At the September ITTC and ITPC meetings, staff presented the preliminary 2045 county population control totals. These were developed from three sources: Woods & Poole, Oklahoma Department of Commerce (ODOC), and ACOG population trend data (Table 1). The preliminary county control totals were used as a guide to develop the 2045 city/entity populations within each county. Initial analysis at the city level showed that Canadian County and Oklahoma County required additional population for the 2045 city level projections. The Canadian County control was raised to 240,243 and Oklahoma County was raised to 927,602, which was a Woods and Poole forecast (Table 2).

Staff developed 2045 city level projections (Table 3) by using the following methods:

- Trend Data Past population trends were used and forecasted to 2045
- Plan Data Local comprehensive plans with future population forecasts were considered
- 2040 Plan Projections Flat population trends required using the 2040 plan projection
- ODOC Population projection based on ODOC forecasts
- Staff Recommendations Some population projections required slight modifications

Once the initial city populations were developed, staff analyzed them for accuracy and referred to the 2040 Plan methodology. For the last plan, Oklahoma City asked to move a portion of its population in Canadian County to Oklahoma County. So, this time, staff moved 20,000 to cover the possible future growth in Oklahoma County. In Cleveland County, the initial 2040 number for Norman was 164,109, which was about 800 more than its 2040 population forecast. Staff thought this population number was too low. In order to keep the county control number the same, staff moved 4,000 from Oklahoma City to Norman. This gave Norman a new 2045 total of 168,109. The population growth between 2015-2045 for the OCARTS area is 35 percent.
