A. CALL TO ORDER

Monica Cardin called the meeting to order at 9:04 a.m.

B. APPROVAL OF THE SEPTEMBER 10, 2020 MEETING MINUTES

Purvi Patel moved to approve the September 10, 2020 minutes. Joyce Green seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

C. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION ONLY:

1. Final 2045 OCARTS County and City Population Projections

John Sharp highlighted the information provided in the agenda memorandum. Mr. Sharp said staff presented the projections last month and went through the county control totals received from Woods and Poole, Oklahoma Department of Commerce (ODOC), and ACOG population trend data. The ACOG historical trend data goes back to 1980. Mr. Sharp said the county numbers were used as a guide, which ACOG staff disaggregated to the city level. He said ACOG staff looked at the population trend data from 1980 through 2045, the Department of Commerce data, and in some cases talked to the cities.

John Sharp went over Table 1: Preliminary 2045 County Population Projections, Table 2: Recommended 2045 County Population Projections, and Table 3: Recommended 2045 County Population Projections for use in the 2045 Plan. Mr. Sharp stressed that this meeting is for review and comments and he will take any other information that members of the committee might have. He said if there is a reason for change, ACOG would like a comment or statement in regard to why the numbers may not be correct.

Commissioner Marc Hader said he felt the 2035 population for Canadian County of 141,137 should be around 150,000. Mr. Sharp explained that the number is an old number that was used for the 2035 plan, and it is in this table as a guide. Julie Shannon with Yukon said the 2019 Census projections has them at 28,000 already, and she anticipates the 2020 Census information will be different than what ACOG has. Mr. Sharp said ACOG is not always comfortable with the Census Bureau's estimates between 2010 and 2020. The Census Bureau numbers tends to wander with their population estimates.

2. Preliminary 2045 OCARTS Employment Projections by County and by City John Sharp highlighted the information provided in the agenda memorandum. Mr. Sharp had the committee refer to the table with the preliminary 2045 OCARTS employment totals. He said Woods and Poole projections were selected for most of the 2045 county and city projections. Mr. Sharp stressed that the numbers are preliminary and at the meeting in November the final numbers will be available for review. He asked to committee to let ACOG know between now and the next meeting if there should be any changes made.

3. Bike to Work Week 2020 Recap

Jordan Evans gave a presentation to the committee covering Bike to Work Week activities in Central Oklahoma. The presentation can be viewed at: http://www.acogok.org/wp-content/uploads/2020/10/BikeToWork_Fall2020_Updated.pdf

4. National Drive Electric Week Central Oklahoma Recap

Eric Pollard highlighted the information provided in the agenda memorandum. Mr. Pollard said ACOG held an EV Poker Run on Saturday, October 3, in Edmond, Oklahoma. Thirty-one participants competed to win the best poker hand by visiting five EV-related stops in the city. Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, ACOG staff utilized social distancing best practices while planning this year's event. National Drive Electric Week celebrations continue through October. A 2020 Poker Run t-shirt will be given to anyone that test drives a Chevrolet Volt until October 31. 5. Air Quality Small Grant Program Call for Projects - Applications Due November 6, 2020

Hannah Nolen said ACOG is continuing its Air Quality Small Grant Program with a FY 2021 Call for Projects this fall. Ms. Nolen said there is \$200,000 available to fund projects that could improve air quality by reducing transportation related emissions. Eligible projects fall into three categories: bicycle/pedestrian infrastructure, transit improvements, and congestion reduction efforts. The Call for Projects opened on Friday, October 2, 2020 and applications will be due Friday, November 6. 6. ACOG CLEAN AIR Grants for OCARTS Area Public Fleets Call for Projects - Application Due November 20, 2020

Eric Pollard said this is an annual grant program that provides funding for vehicle replacement. This can take an older gasoline or diesel vehicle off the road and will help towards the purchase of a new alternative fuel vehicle. He said the grant can also fund fueling or charging infrastructure. The application deadline is November 20, 2020. Mr. Pollard said if you have any interest in the grant to please reach out to the ACOG staff.

7. America Walks Community Change Grant

Jordan Evans said this program will award \$1,500 in a community stipend for projects related to creating healthy, active, and engaging places to live, work, and play. The application process opened on October 5, 2020 and applications are due November 9, 2020. The application and more information can be found at: https://americawalks.org/community-change-grants/.

D. UPDATES FROM MEMBERS

Monica Cardin with Del City said the new Starbucks opened today. Ms. Cardin said Del City has gone through a major reorganization; Tom Leatherbee is no longer the department director as he is now the Deputy City Manager. Also, she is now the Planning Director and Acting Department Director of Community Services. They are working on a Parks master plan, and plan to hire a new parks director.

Chip Nolen with COTPA said they are moving forward with their process to bring in a consultant for a new system design. They are still working through engineering station layouts for the NW BRT.

Joyce Green with Norman said they do not have any big projects since last month.

Purvi Patel with Choctaw said no big updates, but they are busy with rezoning applications.

Sheniqia Hayes with Bethany has no update since she is new and taking over from the previous representative. She has started applying for some of the grants offered by ACOG.

Steven Rhodes with Tinker Air Force Base said they received a 90% draft on their Air Installation Compatible Use Zone (AICUZ) study update. He said Tinker really appreciated the input provided to them by ACOG, Monica Cardin in Del City, and the folks in Oklahoma City. He said the review and comments were sent to the consultant for correction and hopefully they will be getting back a good product.

Julie Shannon with Yukon said their City Manager, Jim Crosby, is retiring in January.

E. NEW BUSINESS

Jordan Evans announced that ACOG is having its first Encompass 2045 Stakeholders Advisory Group meeting next Tuesday, October 20, 2020, at 4 p.m. The meeting invitations were sent to all committee members. Also, invites were sent to other outside stakeholders that ACOG identified.

FINAL 2045 OCARTS EMPLOYMENT PROJECTIONS BY COUNTY AND CITY

INFORMATION:

At the October committee meetings, staff provided the preliminary 2045 OCARTS employment projections by county and city for your review. Below is a summary of the methodology.

As in past plans, staff used Woods and Poole (W&P) employment projections by county as a guide for development of the OCARTS area numbers. The W&P 2045 numbers are by place of residence, and, for modeling purposes, staff requires the data to be by place of work. Therefore, some data adjustments occur before the model runs.

To determine the employment data by place of work, staff calculated the ratio between the 2015 OCARTS county employment totals (shown in Table 1) and the 2015 W&P full county totals. This ratio was then applied to the 2045 W&P figure to calculate the new 2045 OCARTS county data by place of employment totals. This also accounts for OCARTS geography.

After the county level forecasts were developed, the city level employment figures were calculated. Past trends in employment growth, the 2040 OCARTS Plan city employment totals, and 2045 W&P projections (modified by place of work) were used to develop the 2045 city level employment (Table 2). A comment field was added to identify how the preliminary 2045 population by city was chosen. Generally, the 2040 Plan, W&P, Average of Trend + W&P, Trend, or ACOG staff recommendations were the options given by staff. These employment projections lead to an employment growth rate of 49 percent in the OCARTS area between 2015-2045.

Following approval of the 2045 county and city employment totals by the Intermodal Transportation Policy Committee (ITPC), staff can make further progress with the scenario modeling for the disbursement of the 2045 employment throughout the region.

OZONE SEASON 2020 UPDATE

INFORMATION:

During the 2020 ozone season (April through November) there was one Ozone Alert Day and two instances of monitors exceeding the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) ozone standard of 70 ppb. The 2020 regional value for Central Oklahoma is 69 ppb.

EPA's ozone pollution standard uses a three-year average to determine compliance and the new standard is set at 70 ppb. At the end of the 2020 ozone season, the regional three-year average is 69 ppb.

There is significant risk of the Oklahoma City Metropolitan Area violating the ozone pollution standard by the fall of 2021. This intensifies the need for state and regional emissions reductions efforts. ACOG is currently working on a Cost of Nonattainment Study to determine the potential economic and transportation impacts to the Oklahoma City region, if it is designated a nonattainment area.

ACOG and the Oklahoma Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) submitted the region's EPA Ozone Advance Emissions Reductions Projects report on June 8, 2020.

INFORMATION:

The Recreational Trails Program (RTP) is a federal-aid program administered by the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department (OTRD). This reimbursement-type grant program is part of the Transportation Alternatives formula funding. The RTP provides for 80 percent federal share and requires a 20 percent local match. The match may be either in cash or in value of documented contributions. Other sources of federal funds may also be used for the match up to 95 percent of the total project cost.

The grant application deadline is 4:00 p.m. on Friday, January 29, 2021. The 2021 application and further information is available on the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department website, https://www.travelok.com/state-parks/get-involved. The funding cap for non-motorized projects is \$240,000 (with at least a \$60,000 match). There is no cap for motorized projects.

Please carefully read the application forms for specific requirements. Additional information will be required for applications involving land acquisition.
