MINUTES

A. CALL TO ORDER

Chairman John M. Sharp called the meeting to order at 10:10 a.m. He introduced himself and entertained introductions of members, staff, and guests. There was a quorum.

B. APPROVAL OF THE SEPTEMBER 14, 2023 MINUTES

Harry Fenton moved to approve the September 14, 2023 minutes. Brandon Bundy seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

C. ACTION ITEMS:

1. Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA) Proposed Scope Change by the Town of Jones City

Hannah Nolen highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum.

Erik Brandt said Oklahoma County District 1 had concerns that this project is beyond an overlay – reconstruction possibly, so they wondered if it still fit in this program.

Mayor Missy Wilkinson said the engineers defined it as a mill and overlay, and that they were shrinking the project down from one mile to a half mile. They will mill it down some so it is a little more than an overlay, but cannot do much more than that with the \$500,000. She said Britton Rd. from the Jones City city limits to Westminster Rd. is an impossible road to drive down and the original Hiwassee Rd. overlay project had nothing wrong with it.

Harry Fenton suggested that they mill five inches and put three inches of A and two inches of B as the overlay and that may take care of all the issues. That is what the City of Edmond has done with one of their overlay projects.

Erik Brandt said his contact at District 1 felt the subbase was in need of attention.

There being no further discussion, Joshua Johnston moved to recommend that the ACOG MPO Policy Committee approve the proposed CRRSAA project scope change as requested by the Town of Jones City. Harry Fenton seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

D. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION ONLY:

1. Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) Update

Eric Pollard said ACOG recently finalized its agreement with EPA to receive a \$1 million planning grant for the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant to create climate action plans for the Oklahoma City MSA, which extends a little beyond ACOG's current boundaries. He said the Priority Climate Action Plan (PCAP) is due March 1, 2024. EPA has also released a Notice of Funding Opportunity for the CPRG Implementation Grant, that includes about forty-five climate pollution reduction measures that would be eligible for funding. ACOG's intent is to lead an application process and submit an application by April 1, 2024 with our cities, counties, and stakeholders within the region. The State is also planning to submit an application by April 1 for those implementation measures, so ACOG is working closely with them. Mr. Pollard encouraged the committee to look at the

list of eligible items that are linked in the agenda memorandum. The list includes transportation projects, as well as energy efficiency for city and county operations, agriculture, water, and wastewater projects. EPA does not want to fund projects that already have funding streams, so this is about identifying projects within their cities and counties that do not have any current funds available.

Mr. Pollard said there will be an Air Quality Advisory Committee meeting on Tuesday, November 7, at 10 a.m. to have an initial conversation about some of the projects they might be interested in including in the application package. He said the measures must be included in the PCAP to match the implementation items ACOG ends up pursuing.

Mr. Sharp said a consultant will be preparing the PCAP by the March 1 deadline, so ACOG must search for a consultant. Also, ACOG must have a list of projects to submit by February 1 and the implementation applications must be submitted by April 1, so a fast turnaround. These projects could include something at their city hall, wastewater treatment plan, power issues where they swap something not so clean with something cleaner, and the project may not be on their future plans list at this time. He said it is possible to combine all the projects to make one large project application. Only 110 grants will be funded in the country, so with 50 states and 69 MSAs, EPA will possibly give only one grant to each of those groups, including ACOG. EPA may be wanting to get the biggest bang for the buck, so since ACOG does not have a coal-fired energy plant in its region, the need is to look at other things that would help out from an air quality standpoint.

Harry Fenton asked if there were any guidelines, such as, can old gas heaters be replaced with newer heaters that do not pollute. Mr. Pollard said if you tie the measure back to greenhouse gas reduction and you can make an argument that you could not have gone out to apply this to another project, that would be attractive to EPA.

Justin Henry noted how soon the projects must be turned in. Mr. Pollard said the project must tie back to the list of measures that ACOG will include in the plan. Part of the plan development is identifying the things that our cities, counties, and ACOG have jurisdiction over, so that will cut down some of those things.

Chairman Sharp said right now, ACOG is just working with cities and counties. ACOG has not made that determination to work with private companies, oil and gas, or anyone else in that realm, as ACOG staff feels like its members are the highest priority.

On another note, Mr. Pollard thanked all those who submitted applications for the Public Fleet Grant. He said there were a lot of first time applicants. He said the hope is to take those projects to the November ACOG MPO TC meeting for approval.

Chairman Sharp noted that there has been a bigger demand for the CRP and CMAQ funding than originally expected and so has asked ODOT for additional funding that is needed. Sarah McElroy said she sent an email request out this morning, asking for an update.

2. Reminder: Surface Transportation Block Grant - Call for Projects Closes October 31, 2023

Jennifer Sebesta reminded the committee that the deadline to turn in their applications is 4 p.m. Tuesday, October 31. She said if they have questions, please contact ACOG well in advance of the deadline.

Ms. Sebesta said if they submitted a project pre-application, they should have received an email about its status, letting them know if they could move forward or not. She said

if they did not receive the email, they should reach out to her as soon as possible so it can be addressed.

3. Pedestrian Safety Awareness Month

Jose Jimenez said Pedestrian Safety Awareness Month is a new initiative for ACOG during the month of October. He then highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum. He said one of the Norman schools had a Bike to School Day and the Norman Police Department helped with that. Through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, other schools participated in Walk to School Day, and hopefully next year, ACOG can be involved with that initiative.

4. Watch for Me OK Update

Jose Jimenez gave a presentation, which can be viewed here: https://www.acogok.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/10/Watch-for-Me-OK-Update.pdf

Chairman Sharp said if they have an event in their town that Watch for Me could attend, to please let ACOG know. He said preparing for an event from scratch is labor-intensive for everyone and costly, so piggybacking on their events would be helpful.

Sarah McElroy asked if ACOG would be interested in teaming up with schools in the area to attend their events. Mr. Jimenez said yes, ACOG would be interested in going to the schools and talking to a class or working with a school to co-host an event. ACOG is interested in different partnerships to help spread the messaging.

5. Regional Safety Action Plan Update

Hannah Nolen highlighted the information as detailed in the agenda memorandum, noting that Kimley-Horn was chosen as the consultant for the Regional Safety Action Plan, which will be completed by next October.

Chairman Sharp said with this Plan, there will be a toolbox for each community to be able to use.

6. ACOG MPO Transportation Management Area Line Item Projects and Administrative Modifications

Lauren Wood said this month ACOG received one new line item project and no new administrative modifications from the ODOT Planning & Policy Division. She said that the new project was listed and shaded on the page following the agenda memorandum.

7. Projects in the ACOG MPO Transportation Management Area (TMA)

John Sharp said that in November, the plan is to have a quarterly discussion after the ACOG MPO TC meeting with ODOT staff about the status of the projects in the communities.

E. NEW BUSINESS

Chairman Sharp asked if there was any new business to present.

Autonomous Truck Runs

Mr. Sharp said that this morning on KOCO, they said there is a possible trial of autonomous trucks traveling from Houston to Oklahoma City, about an eight-hour trip. There will be a human in the cab, but they will start some testing. In the future, there may also be a convoy of autonomous trucks and one of them will have a driver in it. If interested, the committee may wish to check it out on KOCO.

Oklahoma Bike Summit

Brandon Bundy said the Oklahoma Bike Summit starts tomorrow, October 13-14, at Rose State College and the Midwest City Mayor, Matt Dukes, will start it off. Mr. Bundy said October 13 is for technical experts and October 14 is more for advocates.

SELECTION OF FY 2024 AIR QUALITY SMALL GRANT PROGRAM PROJECTS

INFORMATION:

The FY 2024 funding cycle of the ACOG Air Quality Small Grant Program closed Friday, September 29, 2023. The program is designed to fund air quality related transportation infrastructure projects and congestion relief efforts. With \$4,355,362 available via Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) and Carbon Reduction Program (CRP) funds, ACOG received 19 applications requesting over \$7.1 million.

Applications were reviewed and scored by a committee consisting of ACOG TPS staff and representatives from the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT).

Projects selected for funding can be found in the table on the following page. The top 10 scoring projects are recommended to be funded in full, at a total of \$3,632,643. ACOG recommends that the remaining \$722,719 be allocated to the next highest scoring project, NE 16th St Sidewalks in Oklahoma City, for partial funding. Any additional funding that becomes available should be made available to the NE 16th St Sidewalks project and/or be rolled into the funding pot for the next Call for Projects.

ACTION REOUESTED:

Consider recommending that the ACOG MPO Policy Committee approve funding for the FY 2024 Air Quality Small Grant Program project list (\$3,632,643) and allocate any remaining funds to the next highest scoring project - \$722,719, for a total of \$4,355,362 in funding.

2023 OZONE SEASON UPDATE

INFORMATION:

During the 2023 Ozone Season (April through November) there were twelve (12) Ozone Alert Days and thirty (30) instances of monitors exceeding the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) ozone standard of 70 ppb.

The 2023 regional design value for Central Oklahoma is 73 ppb - a violation of the ozone standard.

EPA's ozone pollution standard uses a three-year average to determine compliance and the current standard is set at 70 ppb. At the end of the 2022 ozone season, the three-year average was 71 ppb. This means that if EPA were to designate the Oklahoma City Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA's) ozone attainment today, the OKC-MSA would be out of attainment of the ozone standard.

The <u>ACOG Cost of Nonattainment Study for the Oklahoma City Area</u> has estimated \$9.6 - \$15.2 billion in negative fiscal impact to the region if this were to occur.

CLIMATE POLLUTION REDUCTION GRANT (CPRG) UPDATE

INFORMATION:

EPA has announced two competitions for the Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG) implementation grants – a general competition for applications from states, municipalities, tribes, tribal consortia, and territories, and a competition only for tribes, tribal consortia, and territories – approximately \$4.3 billion in funding available. These competitions are open to entities that received planning grants (ACOG included) to develop Priority Climate Action Plans (PCAPs) under phase 1 of the CPRG Program, as well as entities that did not directly receive a planning grant (ACOG members) that are applying for funds to implement measures included in an applicable PCAP. Eligible applicants may only apply for funding to implement measures contained in an applicable PCAP. Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Reduction Measures Examples include:

- **Transportation** fleets, bicycle/pedestrian/mode shift, vehicle miles traveled (VMT) reduction
- **Electric Power** renewables, energy efficiency
- Buildings & Industrial energy codes, energy efficiency, electrification, energy performance
- Waste, Water, and Sustainable Materials Management reduced emissions from landfills and wastewater treatment facilities, waste diversion (reuse/recycling/composting)

ACOG staff is seeking input from MPO TC members on GHG reduction measures (see <u>Notice of Funding Opportunity</u> for a list of examples) to be included in the ACOG PCAP which would then be eligible as measures included in an implementation grant application.

ACOG's PCAP for the OKC-MSA is due March 1, 2024. Implementation grant applications are due April 1, 2024.

INFORMATION:

Every year, COKCC submits to the US Department of Energy (DOE) an annual report of its activities and accomplishments for the previous calendar year.

ACOG staff provides data to the National Renewable Energy Lab (NREL) on the sales of alternative fuels, deployment of alternative fuel vehicles and hybrid electric vehicles, idle-reduction initiatives, fuel economy activities, and programs to reduce vehicle miles traveled.

NREL and DOE analyze the data and translate them into fuel conservation and emission reduction impacts for ACOG and COKCC.

In 2022, the coalition reported the following:

- 6,800 pounds of nitrogen oxides (NOx) reduced; 74,852 pounds of volatile organic compounds (VOCs) reduced
- 13.6 million gallons of gasoline equivalent reduced
- 33,014 tons of greenhouse gases reduced
